"The Dog That Didn't Bite"

On the USS Missouri in Tokyo Harbor, General Douglas MacArthur speaks in front of the victorious Allies at the formal signing of surrender by Japan. On his estate in Tokyo, Dr. Shiro Ishii struggles in fear to bury metal boxes full of Unit 731 documents.

One year after the war ends, Anderson is on a golf course in Maryland with friends, he is finally having a good time and laughing again. After some hinch in the clubhouse Anderson decides to drive home.

As he passes by the front gate of Fort Detrick, a biological weapons base. He is stopped by a military motorcade arriving at the base. In one of the cars in the motorcade, Anderson spots several doctors from Unit 731 who had visited Mukden POW Camp during the war. One of the doctors recognizes Anderson but quickly looks away and hides his face.

Anderson is filled with shock, distress, then anger at seeing these doctors from Unit 731, who were notorious for their involvement in monstrous human experiments and sadistic atrocities during the war.

Anderson composes himself and continues driving. While driving, he begins to cry and has a series of flashbacks to his wartime experimences, including the Bataan Death March, Cabanatuan POW Camp. Hell Ships, and the Mukden POW Camp.
